Preparing for take off

Driving through the beautiful hills of eastern Scotland, it's hard not to think of this land's rich evangelical history. From John Knox to Mary Slessor, Scotland has been the birthplace of some of the world's greatest revivals and missions movements. When I (Hannah) spent my first months there in 2018, I stood amazed as time and again individuals told even of the works of God in more recent history in the Isle of Lewis Revival. Scotland has appropriately been penned "The Land of Many Revivals".

e see this same hunger for the Lord still today. When the Lord first led me to the UK in 2016, the first place I landed was Scotland. At that point, I was unsure where I would eventually settle and never truly considered Scotland as an option. But the Lord had other plans and continued to place it on my heart, eventually moving me back there in 2018. The autumn of 2018 to summer 2019 really became a year of planting the vision in my own heart. I knew this was where the Lord had called but was again unsure where to begin. Throughout the year, the Lord patiently guided me as I led two school clubs and partnered with local churches for different one-off events. When Simon and I knew the Lord was leading us to marriage, we recognised that it would most likely mean a time



away from Scotland. Yet, we knew also that the Lord would lead us back...

My (Simon) first connection with Scotland began when I was saved there at a camp in Gartmore at the age of 11. I was born and raised in Northern Ireland. Although my family name has a

rich Scottish heritage I never truly considered moving away from home. In January 2015 I was introduced to my first CEF training through a Teaching Children Effectively (TCE) course. This gave me a great vision for how CEF cover the big picture of children's and youth ministry. I had known for some time now that God was calling me into ministry but was unsure in what capacity, as I felt unequipped for service. The

following year the opportunity came to take the first half of CEF's Children's Ministry Leadership Course (CMLC) in Northern Ireland. I jumped at the opportunity! It was there that I met Hannah, and where the Lord challenged me specifically on the need for men in ministry, especially in children's ministry.

Through my many church connections our friendship began with me giving Hannah contacts for ministry in Scotland when she first was considering it for missions in 2017. Each of these contacts developed into greater opportunities to reach children and we are still in connection with them today. As our relationship developed, I saw the great need to cultivate ministry in Scotland. I felt the Lord was opening a door for me with the passion He has given me, not only for children's ministry but for equipping and encouraging local churches and believers to reach their local children. The Lord used the words of Nehemiah to confirm in my own heart the way ahead. "Let us rise up and build'. So they strengthened their hands for the good work". (2, v.18c)

In many ways the timing of the future



is still unknown. We are grateful for this year of transition in our first year of marriage. We are grateful for this year away in Northern Ireland preparing and training for full time ministry. In spite of the unknowns and details still to fall in place, we know the Lord is faithful. He will faithfully guide us and other workers in Scotland as we seek

to reach children for Christ. Although it is very easy to look to the future and have expectations of what we want to see done, ultimately, we have both been challenged in this last season to rest our plans at His feet and to pray. Pray for the children in Scotland. Pray for the believers in Scotland. Pray for His timing, His place, and His leading as we look to the year ahead.

Now is the time for us

Many years ago, we were asked to lead the children's Bible Club at our church and it was there we met Judy Buis, a CEF missionary from the USA, when she came to speak about her work. It was very evident that she had a strong emphasis on the importance of sound doctrine, and especially in the times that we live in.

udy visited our Bible club a few times and she encouraged us to take the 3 month CMLC course in Switzerland. We were keen and our church were supportive also, but it was not an easy plan to put in motion. Our boys were aged 11, 13, and 15 at the time and would have to miss some school and take their school work to Switzerland, John would have to take 3 months unpaid leave from his work - we still had a mortgage, professional fees for John's work and regular bills to pay for our house while we were away and we would have to raise the funds for the training. Our church willingly supported us by paying the fees. We managed to raise the rest mostly by generous gifts. We arrived in Kilchzimmer in Summer of 2013 and settled into the intensive course. The first thing of note that we learned, was the difference between telling children a Bible story

and teaching a Bible lesson, identifying central truths and getting creative, thorough memory verse teaching and teaching doctrines to children. The teachers were inspiring. Jennifer Haaijer's

ability to be both profound and simple became the benchmark for the Bible lesson. Margaret Adamson's experience was evident in her ability to be very easy going and pleasant while being incredibly engaging and thorough. Gerd Walter Buskies demonstrated teaching doctrines to children and yet again it was amazing to see how you can be both profound and simple when teaching children. There are many more memorable aspects, the victorious life, time management and so much more that equipped us. We were full of enthusiasm for the ministry by the time we finished the course but again it was not easy to just walk into a ministry. We were under financial strain at the time and we could not take that with us into ministry and raise enough support to pay our mortgage and support our 3 boys. We continued to teach our GNC for a few years but plans to become CEF workers went on the back burner until recently.

We discussed Martha becoming a CEF worker on her own seeing as it seemed impossible for both of us, and started to push the doors prayerfully. Our church was supportive and Martha applied to become a part-time CEF worker with John helping out as a volunteer. We both went to the CEF workers conference in Northampton in November and had a great time of fellowship with the other workers. After this, John decided to commit himself officially to CEF work, one day a week. So it wasn't a jump of faith – but small tentative prayerful steps of faith because we wanted to be sure that God was opening the doors and going before us. We are excited about being involved in the wonderful ministry of bringing God's word to children. Currently we are part of a church in the Govanhill area of Glasgow. This is a very multi-cultural area with many Roma children and South Asian families. It is a deprived area of Glasgow with a lot of problems and our church seeks to be a light in the darkness. We plan to start a GNC in our church.

Please pray with us as we take these steps of faith into ministry – that we will raise funds, that children will come to the GNC and be saved. CEF was once much larger in Scotland than it is now and we hope that it will grow – and that through the ministry of CEF the Word of God will be brought to children throughout Scotland.

I know who holds the future

Living in Scotland was never part of my plan. I was going to finish my schooling, go to university, and become a primary school teacher somewhere in suburban America. Maybe, if God was so inclined, I would teach somewhere like Africa or Asia. But Scotland? It had never crossed my mind.

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Today, I sit in my flat in a small town between Edinburgh and Glasgow, a fulltime missionary with Child Evangelism Fellowship, ever-so-thankful that God works out His plans in spite of my own. Though I never imagined myself in this place, I know—not only intellectually, but experientially—that God's ways are infinitely higher than mine.

While I had a dream of teaching a classroom of children their ABCs and how to add two plus two, God gave me the privilege of teaching classrooms of children about their Creator who loves them and wants them to know Him. Just this last summer, I was part of a group who went into two primary schools

in Livingston, Scotland, to share the Gospel. God opened the door for us to be in every single classroom, sharing the Good News of Jesus with over 600 children in one week. One little girl came up to me and said, "Thank you for coming! I've never heard that God made me..." Other children sat with looks of awe on their faces as they touched a Bible for the first time. "These are really God's words?" they asked.

The door is open for us, yet again, to go into these primary schools this summer. He's also given us the

God's plan took me to Scotland, a place I never imagined myself living. But He also has taken me around the world, serving in places I never imagined myself serving. The other side of my role with Child Evangelism Fellowship is an international one, working alongside the directors of leadership and ministry

The National Directors Institute (NDI) is a two-week training course, where 30-40 directors from across the globe gather to rest, learn, and fellowship together. The two most recent NDIs took place in Sri Lanka and Brazil. Getting to travel to these places and meet the directors from every region of the world is something I'll never forget. God even allowed me to use my passion for teaching in each of these places, a gift and blessing I'll treasure forever.

In Isaiah 55:9, we read, "For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts." While I thought I would be teaching phonics in suburban USA, God knew I would be teaching the Gospel in Scotland and leadership principles around the globe. All glory be to His name!
